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


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Site Analysis: NEIGHBORHOOD GREEN SPACE CONTEXT

- The park sits amid a constellation of green spaces throughout the Roxbury neighborhood; opportunity exists for Gourdin Park to serve as a hub with spokes (in the form of tree-lined pedestrian ways) leading to the surrounding parks.
- While several surrounding parks serve as neighborhood playgrounds (active recreation spaces), others provide space for both active and passive recreation.
- Other commemorative parks include the Alvah Kittredge Park, Highland Park, Heritage State Park/Eliot Square, and the Dudley Town Common








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Site Analysis: IMMEDIATE CONTEXT

- A mix of residential, commercial, and civic/social service buildings surround the park, including the former Boys' Club (west side), Police Station (south side), Post Office (north side), Dudley Branch of the Boston Public Library (to the east), Yawkey Club (also to the east), and District Courthouse (also to the east)
- The transportation corridor connecting Ruggles/Roxbury Crossing and Dudley Square passes by the park; opportunity exists to make the park and sculpture a memorable spot along the route
- Future development is proposed and under construction in Dudley Square and along Washington Street (Bartlett Yard)
- Street life in the area is lively and constant and will increase as new commercial and residential developments open

THE PARK TODAY: Existing Park Conditions



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Site Analysis: EDGES, TOPOGRAPHY & VIEWS


- The elevated topography and narrow sidewalk along the west (Shawmut Avenue) edge creates a barrier between the street and park; sidewalk is separate from the park
- Level topography along the east and south edges invites users into the park; sidewalk is part of the park
- Visitors arriving at the park from the northwest, southwest, and west enjoy open views into the landscape
- Views into the park from the east side are obstructed by dense tree growth, especially low-growing limbs
- Park users can enjoy views to the surrounding neighborhood from many spots; views of the police station, Dudley Street (east and west) and the Post Office are particularly pleasant
- Views into the park are possible from the upper floors of surrounding buildings, including the Police Station


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Site Analysis: ACCESS & CIRCULATION

- Safe entrances those that connect to crosswalks -- appear at the east and southwest corners
- Three unsafe entrances stand along each of the three sides (none connects to a crosswalk)
- The entrance off Shawmut Avenue lacks a ramp (and is not ADA-compliant)
- Most of the concrete walkways seem heavilyused
- Linden trees planted along the Shawmut Avenue edge obstruct pedestrian use in this area
- Users cut from the northeast and northwest corners across the lawns
- The Boston Police Department is currently using the central east-west walkway as a launch for vehicles pursuing traffic violators along Dudley Street

THE FUTURE PARK:

Constraints and Opportunities



Park and Memorial Design



CONSTRAINTS

- Traffic flows along all sides of the park, creating a noisy and somewhat frenetic setting
- Low-branching deciduous trees obstruct views looking into and out of the park
- The entrances from mid-block connects the park to the police station, but the crossing is unsafe
- Circulation paths dominate and the landscape lacks spaces for gathering, performances, etc.
- Elevated topography along the west edge creates a natural separation between the park and adjacent neighborhood













OPPORTUNITIES

- Views from upper stories of surrounding buildings can be preserved and enhanced in the new park design, incorporating views of the sculpture
- By establishing a formal entrance or entrances, visitors will experience a sense of arrival
- Existing healthy trees can be incorporated into the new design, where possible
- Existing site features, including benches and luminaires, can be reused where possible
- Interpretive signs can be installed to clearly identify the park and outline its commemorative significance
- The sculpture may be sited in a visible location (to be viewed from outside), or deeper inside the park (a more contemplative location)
